The Importance of Vocabulary Development in the Primary Grades Furthermore, the language children are exposed to at home and in school influences the development of their language comprehension. This, in turn, influences their ability to develop reading and writing skills. Language development in the preschool years is relevant to the later teaching of reading and writing, especially in the primary grades.

Fostering Academic Language Development in Primary Grades ... Reading aloud is a common practice in primary classrooms and is viewed as an important vehicle for vocabulary development. Read alouds are complex instructional interactions in which teachers choose texts, identify words for instruction, and select the appropriate strategies to facilitate word learning.

Vocabulary Development During Read Alouds: Primary ... In grades 3 through 12, an average student is likely to learn approximately 3,000 new vocabulary words each year, if he or she reads between 500,000 and a million running words of text a school year (Nagy & Anderson, 1984).

What Does the Research Say About Vocabulary? A constant message given to those teaching the students with language difficulties is to focus on the core vocabulary. The key word approach and mind mapping provides a way of doing this. Text can be prepared by key wording. For example the pupils can be encouraged to:

Children with Language Difficulties in Primary School ... Students ' spelling knowledge is, therefore, a powerful foundation for their reading and their vocabulary development. This latter aspect is linked to the role that morphological knowledge plays, as discussed in the previous section. Words that are related in meaning are often related in spelling, despite changes in sound.

Teaching and Developing Vocabulary Vocabulary development is a crucial part of reading, writing and functioning in the classroom and is described by Scarborough3, (2001) as one of the many strands that are woven into skilled reading. A large body of research has demonstrated the critical link between early vocabulary knowledge and later achievement in reading2.

Working with students with language impairment: Vocabulary Primary language learning is complementary to the skills development which includes learning about and through language that is going on elsewhere in the curriculum. It supports generic literacy skills and facilitates the revisiting and consolidation of concepts and skills learned in the first language. Learning a language enriches the curriculum.
